Significance ^{3.}	This building served the educational needs of area children for about 17 years. Cottage schools were meant as temporary educational buildings to meet the needs of rapid growth, designed to eventually revert to apartments once no longer needed. The 24th avenue cottage school is the only known example in Calgary which has fulfilled that intended second use. One of only 4 remaining wooden cottage schools in Calgary, and the sole example of an American Colonial Revival style, unlike the other 3 house-like structures, the site is of city-wide importance because it was repurposed as intended. It had four classrooms, with washrooms in the basement. By 1931 was listed in the city directory as the Beverley Apartments, with four suites. In the 1980s it was covered with vinyl siding, concealing the fact that it is one of the oldest buildings in Cliff Bungalow.		
Status	A development permit application (DP2016-0845) was applied for by Stonebriar Crafted Homes on March 7, 2016 but has not been released. The application for 1 building of 16 units is proposed to redevelop the sites of the Cottage School plus two homes to the east at 522 and 524 24 th Ave SW.		

	The proposed development is within the existing zoning for the site. No demolition		
	permit has been applied for. Development signage was placed on site but has since been		
	removed.		
	At this time the original plans for the site appear to be dormant.		
CHI's Position			
	As one of only 4 remaining historical cottage schools, and the only one remaining in the		
Statement	southern quadrants of Calgary, this school is also of a unique architectural design which is		
	transitionary between the style of cottage and larger bungalow schools. It continues to		
	function as residential apartments, contributing to the diversity of housing in Cliff		
	Bungalow. CHI supports the preservation and protection of this important resource.
