## Inglewood Bridge

Significance <sup>3.</sup>	The East Calgary (Inglewood) Bridge is an example of a Parker Camelback, through-truss, steel bridge, which was the most frequently used design for bridges built in Calgary from 1905 to 1912. It is the second-oldest of four surviving examples of this type of bridge in Calgary. It the location of the first bridge crossing on the Elbow River, established in 1884, being the fourth bridge at this site. It marks an important historic crossing, linking the two most historic parts of Calgary, the original Calgary town site (now Inglewood) with the second Calgary town site (now East Village and downtown). It is a landmark due to its long-standing and integral function as a primary transportation link; its distinctive design; and its `gateway' status as a entry feature to the Inglewood and downtown/ East village areas. City Wide Historic Resource
Status	The bridge will be replaced with construction beginning in fall 32018 and lasting about 2 years. The City of Calgary claims it has outlasted its original lifespan, has a reduced load carrying capacity, does not meet current design and engineering standards and its deteriorated physical condition has led to increasing costs to repair and maintain it.

CHI's Position	The Inglewood bridge is not only a significant historic resource, it is also a landmark
Statement	entrance into the historic community of Inglewood, one that provides traffic calming to
	the pedestrian oriented main street. CHI's preference would be for the bridge to remain,
	and should it be replaced any new structure should retain elements of the historic bridge
	and/or be of equal or greater landmark design. For example, the trusses from the current
	bridge have heritage value and the city is reportedly looking at how to incorporate the
	trusses into the final design.
